His research focuses on post-Keynesian macroeconomics, money, financial systems, distribution and growth, and European economic policies. He teaches Macroeconomics, as well as Growth and Distribution in the Master programme.

Her lectures cover German individual and collective labour law, as well as European and international labour law, both in bachelor and master programmes. Her research deals with issues of collective labour law, as for example the right to strike, European works councils and transnational collective bargaining, but also touches areas concerning the prevention of social dumping or precarious work (such as posting of workers or agency work). The impact of trade and investment agreements on social standards is another topic of research. Furthermore, she is engaged in research on gender issues, such as equal pay.
