	<p>Eckhard Hein</p> <p>Academic Director of the Master International Economics</p> <p>Eckhard Hein is Professor of Economics and Academic Director of the Master International Economics Programme at Berlin School of Economics and Law (HWR). He is also a member of the consortium and a local coordinator of the Erasmus Mundus Master Programme Economic Policies for the Global Bifurcation (EPoG-JM), a Member of the Institute for International Political Economy Berlin (IPE), a Research Associate at the Levy Economics Institute, Annandale-on-Hudson, New York, and at the Centre d’Economie de l’Universite Paris Nord (CEPN-ACT), a Member of the Coordination Committee and a Fellow of the Forum for Macroeconomics and Macroeconomic Policies (FMM), and a Co-editor of the European Journal of Economics and Economic Policies: Intervention. His research focuses on post-Keynesian macroeconomics, money, financial systems, distribution and growth, demand and growth regimes, and European economic policies. 	<p>Martina Metzger</p> <p>Martina Metzger is a Professor of Monetary Economics at the Berlin School of Economics and Law (HWR) with a focus on the Global South. In that context, she serves as the liaison person of HWR's research co-operation with Southwestern University of Finance and Economics in Chengdu (China) and Deutsche Bundesbank Berlin and Brandenburg on monetary policy. She is also a Member of the Institute for International Political Economy Berlin (IPE) and of the Centre d'Economie de l'Universite Paris Nord (CEPN-ACT). Her areas of expertise cover money, macro and finance; digital financial services, incl. CBDCs, private cryptocurrencies, and mobile money; financial sector development, including financial market regulation; and regional financial and monetary cooperation. Accordingly, macro, finance & development figure prominently in her lectures both in bachelor and master programmes. She is a full qualified lawyer (2nd state exam) and holds a PhD in Law. Her lectures cover German individual and collective labour law, as well as European and international labour law, both in bachelor and master programmes.
